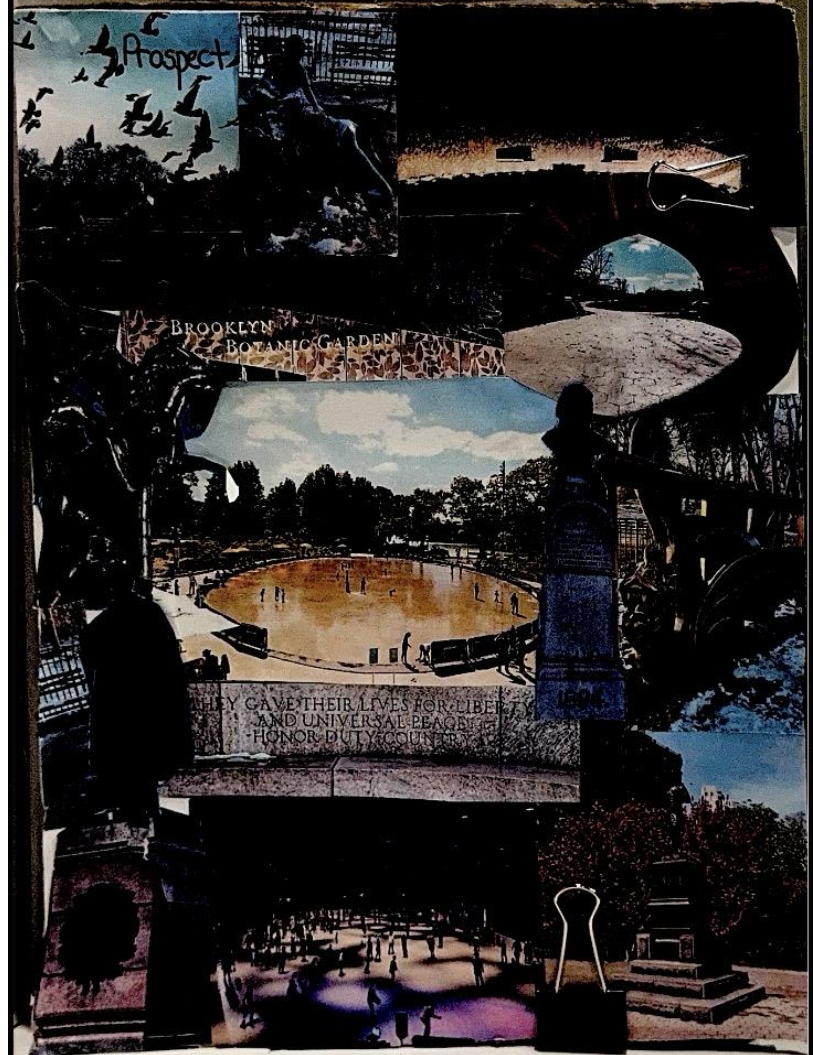


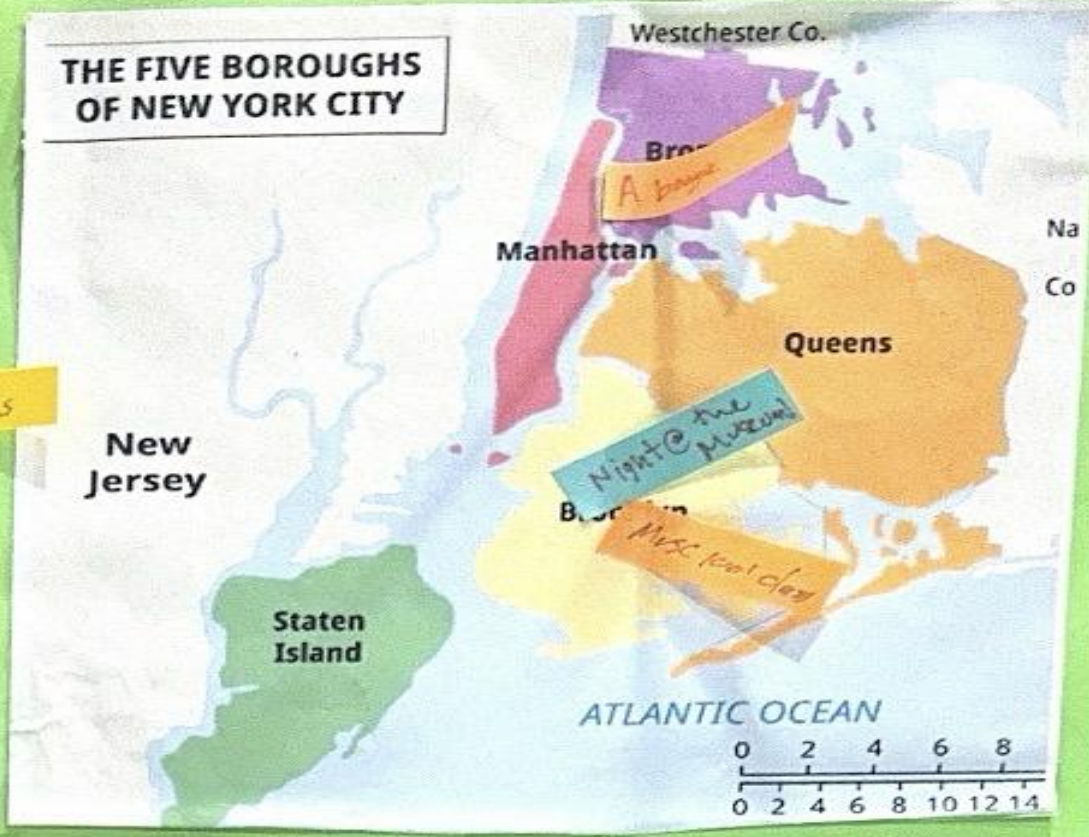
Art in the Communities of Brooklyn NY

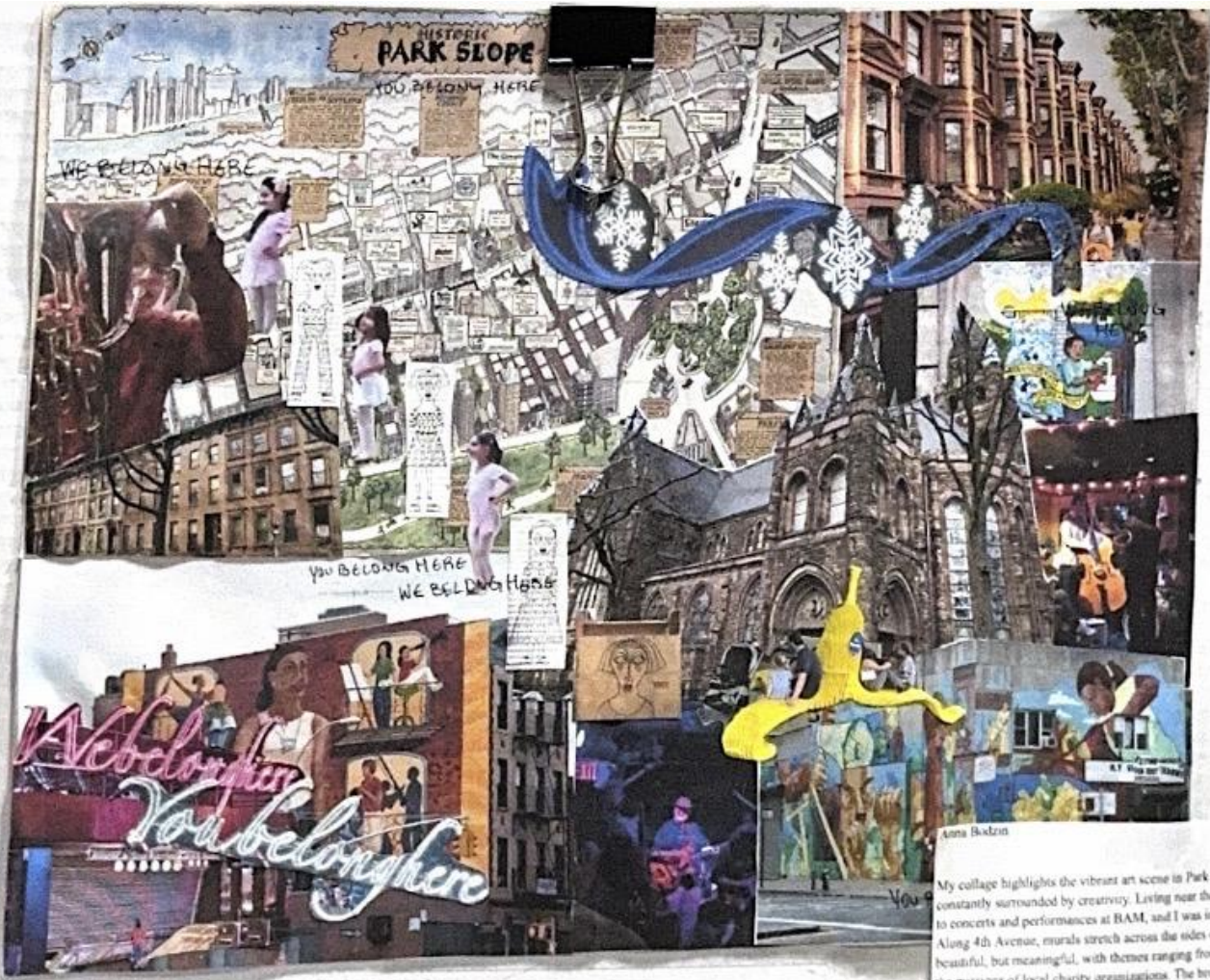
