Now Subways

As New York City modernized into the 21st century, the subway system did too. This was done to accommodate the growing population throughout the city and bring accessibility to many stations after the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) was passed in 1990. New train cars such as the R211 running on the (A)(B)(C)(G) and (SIR) lines. Stations are currently undergoing major rehabilitation projects as a result of Congestion Pricing, while others receive smaller scale upgrades such as cleanings, new paint, tiles, etc as a part of the MTA's Re-NEW-vation project. Art is also integrated to bring life into the stations. Through the program MTA Art and Design, stations also serve as public-art museum with over 400 permanent artwork present ranging from mosaics, glass art, metal, murals all over the subway system.

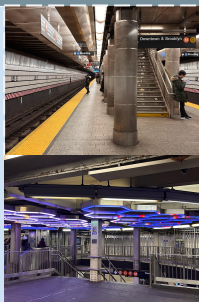

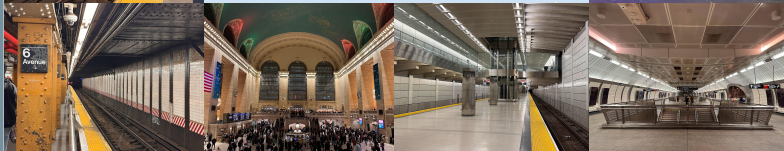

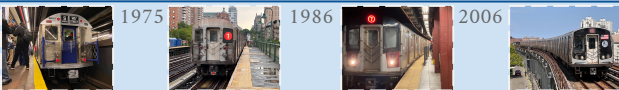
Old City Hall Station (6) - (Manhattan)
